Dame Mary Gilmore was a notable poet, teacher and journalist.

Gilmore wrote many poems and worked tirelessly for workers' rights and those of the underprivileged. She also wrote memoirs of colonial Australia, represented by a windmill in the transparent window in the note.

A.B. "Banjo" Patterson is on the flip side of the note. He was a poet and writer. He is most famous for his poems *Waltzing Matilda* and *The Man From Snowy River*. He often wrote under the name "The Banjo" telling tales of the bush and folklore.

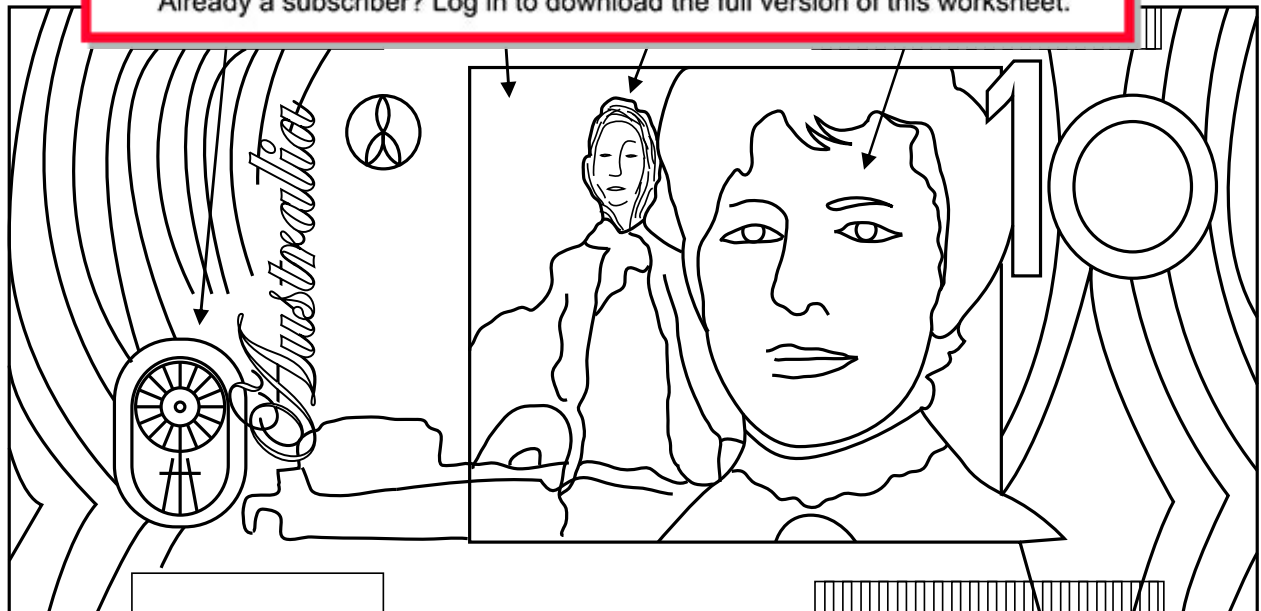
