
Queen Elizabeth II is Queen of Australia. She is the constitutional monarch, which means she acts on the advice of the Australian Parliament. She is also Queen of the United Kingdom and Head of the Commonwealth.

The Governor-General, appointed on advice from the Australian Prime Minister, is her representative in Australia. The Governors in each state also act as her representatives.

Parliament House in Canberra is on the flip side of the \$5 note. Built in 1988, the building design is based on two boomerangs and has an 81 m flagpole on the top. It has 4,700 rooms, most of which are open to the public. It is situated on Capital Hill.

The Queen offers patronage to many organisations. She holds many titles in the Australian Armed Forces and undertakes ceremonial roles in Australia.
